God's Unfair Love

"He was pierced for our sins and crushed for the wrong things we did." (Isaiah 53:5)

In 2013, a 13-year-old girl named Jahi had surgery to remove her tonsils. At first, everything seemed fine. But soon she started bleeding. Her heart stopped, and her brain was damaged. She lived on life support for a few years, but later she died. Her parents must have said: "This is not fair!"

We also feel this way sometimes:

- We study hard, but get a bad grade.
- We work hard, but someone else gets the reward.
- We believe in God, but life is still very hard.

We may ask, "Is God fair?" The Bible says God wants us to be holy: "Be holy because I, the Lord your God, am holy." (Leviticus 19:2)

And it says, "The one who sins is the one who will die." (Ezekiel 18:20)

We all sin, so we all deserve God's punishment. **But God did something amazing**.

He did not punish us. He punished Jesus instead.

- · Jesus was hurt because of our sins.
- Jesus suffered so we can have peace.
- Jesus died in our place.

This is very **unfair** for Jesus. But it shows how much **God loves us**. We don't deserve this love—but God gave it to us anyway.

Because Jesus died for us and rose again, we are forgiven. No matter what we've done or where we are, we can say: "God is with me. God loves me."

Jesus is always with us—no matter where we are in life. In my ministry, I've visited many people with dementia. Though I see them in the room, sometimes I don't know where they are in their minds. Some feel like they're back in childhood, or with loved ones who have passed away. Some are in peaceful places, others in dark and confusing ones. I try to meet them where they are—but I can't always reach them. But Jesus can.

When I visit them, I often read from Psalm 139:

"Where can I go from your Spirit?
Where can I flee from your presence?
If I go up to the heavens, you are there.
If I make my bed in the depths, you are there...
Even there your hand will guide me," (7–10 NIV)

What a comfort to know: "You are there... even there." Wherever their minds may wander—past, present, joy, or fear—Jesus is with them. That truth brings peace not only to those with dementia, but to their families too.

And this promise is for all of us. No matter where we are—physically, emotionally, spiritually—**Jesus is there**. Lord, where are you?

You are there in my pain. You are there in my joy.

You are there when I'm afraid.

You are there in my past and future.

You are there in my guilt and weakness. You are there when I cry for mercy.

Why? **Because you were there on the cross**, **dying for me.** And now, you live. So wherever I go in life—**you are there**.
