#### SCRITPURE OF THE MONTH

If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you.

James 1:5

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#### **Distorted Bible passages: Psalm 23:4**

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil." (Psalm 23:4) This verse is a source of deep comfort to many. But what does "the valley of the shadow of death" really mean?

In Psalm 23, God is described as our shepherd. Just as a shepherd cares for his sheep, **God provides, protects, and guides His people.** The phrase "valley of the shadow of death" **in Hebrew can also mean "deep darkness"**—not just death itself, but any time of fear, uncertainty, or sorrow.

Imagine walking alone down a pitch-black alley at 2 a.m. in a dangerous neighborhood.

Illness, grief, loneliness, or fear about the future—these can all be "valleys" we walk through. And yet David declares, "I will fear no evil, for You are with me."

Of course, this verse also includes the reality of death. When we stand at the bedside of a dying loved one or face our own mortality, the Lord is still with us.

Jesus Christ, our Good Shepherd, laid down His life for us and rose again in victory over death. Because of Him, we need not fear—even when we walk through life's darkest valleys.

The Bible is filled with metaphors and poetic language. Rather than interpreting every word literally, we are invited to listen closely to the context, to the flow of Scripture as a whole, and most of all, to the heart of God. In doing so, we come to know His love and protection more deeply in our daily walk of faith.

How can we know if a Bible passage is meant literally or figuratively? In general, we read the words plainly unless the context suggests a symbolic meaning.

When Jesus tells a parable, He often begins with, "The kingdom of heaven is like..." — letting us know He's speaking figuratively. Paying attention to context and language helps us grasp the message more deeply.

Resources like *The People's Bible* (Northwestern Publishing House) are helpful tools for deeper understanding.
